Principal Activity and Review of the Business

The principal activity of the company is to focus on the following core objectives which are common to all CCC's and against which Kildare County Childcare Committee Limited have identified relevant and related actions to be carried

1. Support DCYA's Finance and Governance Unit to:

Provide information, support and guidelines in relation to the DCYA's Early Years and School Age Capital 2019 funding programme

Provide information and support to childcare service providers in relation to issues identified as a result of Visits in respect of the following DCYA programmes: Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE), Compliance Subvention (CCS), Community Childcare Subvention Private (CCSP) and Training and Community Childcare Employment Childcare (TEC)

- Support the development and sustainability of the community childcare sector.

2. To support the DYCA's Quality Unit to:

- Deliver Child Protection and Welfare training as per National Programme

- Provide information to early year's sector in relation to statutory regulations, national policy, qualifications, standards and quality supports including toileting.

The Company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

There has been no significant change in these activities during the financial year ended 31 December 2019.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties that face the company is that if the funding from Pobal was to be stopped.

Financial Results

The deficit for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to €(5,544) (2018 - €(8,684)).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €143,570 (2018 - €148,809) and liabilities of €63,708 (2018 - €63,403). The net assets of the company have decreased by €(5,544).

The company plans to continue its present activities and current trading levels. Employees are kept as fully informed as practicable about developments within the business.

Post Balance Sheet Events

Since 31 December 2019, the spread of Covid-19 has severly impacted many locak economies around the globe. In many countries, businesses are being forced to cease or limit operations for long or indefinite periods of time. Measures taken to contain the spread of the virus, including travel bans, quarantines, social distancing and closures of non-essential services have triggered significant disruptions to businesses worldwide, resulting in an economic slowdown. Global stock markets have also experienced great volatility and a signifiacnt weakening. Governments and central banks have responded with monetary and fiscal interventions to stabilise economic conditions. Kildare County Childcare Committee Limited continues to receive funding from Pobal and will continue to receive funding for the foreseeable future.

The company has determined that these events are non-adjusting subsequent events. Accordingly, the financial position and results of operations as of and for the year ended 31 December 2019 have not been adjusted to reflect their impact. The duration and impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as the effectiveness of government and central bank responses, remains unclear at this time. It is not possible to reliably estimate the duration and severity of these consequences, as well as their impact on the financial position and results of the Company for future periods.

The auditors, Keith Traynor Accountants, (Certified Public Accountants) have indicated their willingness to continue in office in accordance with the provisions of section 383(2) of the Companies Act 2014.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Kildare County Childcare Committee Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. The registered office of the company is Unit 21, Thompson Enterprise Centre, Clane Business Park, Clane, Co. Kildare which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2019 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" (FRS 102).

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

Income

The whole of the turnover is attributable to the principal activity of the comapny which is wholly undertaken in Ireland.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

15% Straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Employee benefits

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund.

Taxation and deferred taxation

Current tax represents the amount expected to be paid or recovered in respect of taxable income for the financial year and is calculated using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted at the Balance Sheet date.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future, or a right to pay less tax in the future. Timing differences are temporary differences between the company's taxable income and its results as stated in the financial statements.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are anticipated to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the Balance Sheet date.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Income and Expenditure Account.

DEPARTURE FROM COMPANIES ACT 2014 PRESENTATION 3.

The directors have elected to present an Income and Expenditure Account instead of a Profit and Loss Account in these financial statements as this company is a not-for-profit entity.

GOING CONCERN 4.

The Directors are closely monitoring the risks and uncertainties associated with the Covid-19 pandemic. Currently the premises are closed to customers and the public and our staff are enabled to work remotely to continue to provide services to clients. The directors consider that the company has adequate financial reserves to cope with the financial impact of Covid-19 in 2020. Therefore the directors have deemed it appropriate to prepare the statutaoty financial statements on a going concern basis.
